TALE OFFERS VIRTUAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT IN THE AGE OF DIGITAL LEARNING

While 2020 had its challenges, TALE was still able to do great things for literacy education in Texas! As we were not able to host an in-person conference this year, TALE moved to providing free virtual professional development sessions from leading experts in the field.

Beginning in the summer of 2020, TALE partnered with Dr. Kay Wijekumar and her team from Texas A&M University to provide professional development on building students' reading comprehension using text-structure instruction.

Then in the fall, Dr. Benita Brooks from Sam Houston State University led a professional learning session on

equity and literacy. Dr. Brooks reminded all attendees that it's important for teachers to get close in order to know our students' culture, history, and identity.

Dr. Elsa Cardenas-Hagan led the next session on literacy instruction for English learners. In her session, Dr. Cardenas-Hagan described a comprehensive and evidence-based approach for teaching the foundational skills of literacy to English Learners and participants learned how to use cross-linguistic connections for the development of phonological awareness, phonics, vocabulary, fluency and comprehension. More information can be found in her recent book Literacy Foundations for English Learners.

Finally, to close out 2020, Dr. Chase Young from Sam Houston State University hosted a session on the importance of oral reading fluency and effective fluency instruction for all students. During his session. Dr. Young provided participants with a multitude of resources and ideas for incorporating reading fluency instruction into the classroom in whole-group, small group, and one-on-one settings. 

What degrees do you hold?

I earned an Ed.D. in Curriculum and Instruction: Reading, Language Arts, and Literature at the University of Houston in 2013, a master's degree in Curriculum and Instruction (Reading) at the University of Texas at Austin, and a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies at the University of Houston.

How are you involved with TALE?

I have attended and presented at TALE conferences since 2015 and have published articles in the Texas Journal of Literacy Education. I also served as an editor for TJLE for three years. Recently, I participated in a virtual book study initiated by TALE.

What is your literacy vision?

My passion is to help children become life readers by placing engaging books in their hands and arming their teachers with techniques to foster a love for reading through these books. I have carried out my research agenda through my work with undergraduate and graduate students, colleagues, and teachers and children in five local schools. I spend time in classrooms as a literacy consultant. Through these experiences, I bring to my research agenda observations about how young children "join the literacy club" (Smith, 1988) and how teachers facilitate this process.

What is something in your life you are most proud of?

Three years ago, I initiated an in-school tutorial program, IHEART (Islanders Helping the Early Acceleration of Readers Together), at Kennedy Elementary School in West Oso ISD. The mission of the program is to provide children with early reading intervention, through research-based instruction, and to give teacher candidates opportunities to implement strategies learned in their reading courses. Due to the pandemic, a colleague and I have assisted the children by pairing them with teacher candidates in a virtual learning environment. This has been challenging, but extremely rewarding for the children and our undergraduate students.

What words of advice would you offer to other literacy leaders?

Read about literacy instruction. Narrow down to a few things you are most intrigued about as you work with youngsters and teachers since there is so much available literature and it can be overwhelming. Also, observe children and teachers as much as you can, including yourself! Don't be afraid to record your teaching and analyze the videos and invite peers to analyze them – this is the best form of professional development.

What degrees do you hold?

Bachelor of Science in Interdisciplinary Studies Pre-K-6; Master of Education in Curriculum and Instruction with an Emphasis in Reading and Literacy (both degrees from Texas A&M -- Whoop!)

How are you involved with TALE?

During my Texas A&M Masters program I became friends with TALE's chair, Alida Hudson, and ever since she has always encouraged me to be a literacy advocate for students -- this included introducing me to TALE! I first attended the 2019 TALE Conference where I learned an incredible amount of research-based practices and I have continued to attend online workshops during the pandemic.

What is your literacy vision?

Literacy is a human right. It is my literacy vision to provide all children the highest quality, evidence-based teaching regardless of socio-economic background or learning differences in order to help them access their full potentials; to do this, it is imperative to also empower teachers with knowledge of effective reading instruction. With the right reading interventions and opportunities for relevant preparation of educators, every child can learn how to read and write.

What is something in your life you are most proud of?

As the pandemic shut down my first year of teaching and continues into my second year, I am proud to be a teacher: a consistent force for my students during these difficult times. I am also proud of achieving my goal for the Reading Specialist certification so that I can have bigger impact in the literacy world.

What words of advice would you offer to other literacy leaders?

Whether you are a director at the district level, a reading specialist or a classroom teacher as I am, we are all literacy leaders. The best leaders also continue to be learners. Continue to seek out evidence-based strategies, be open to trying something new you have learned, and be loud about best literacy practices to ensure impact on student success.


